Guests large and small alighted at an elegant kiddie carnival last month during the annual Snuggly Soiree fun-raiser hosted by philanthropists **Ann** and Gordon Getty in their Gold Coast manse.

Well-dressed tots careened around the marble courtyard set up with myriad delights from face painting to gourmet fairground food cooked up by Getty chef Jennifer Johnson as their folks raised \$200K in support of the Glogau Teddy Bear Rescue Fund at UCSF Benioff Children's Hospital.

Even Ann Getty couldn't resist the lure of a spin on a carnival-style motorcycle ride, expertly racing a few rounds against a determined 10-year-old.

Founded 11 years ago by Pam Glogau and her husband, Dr. Richard Glogau, the fund recently surpassed

the \$1 million mark in providing basic comforts (including food, transportation, housing, medications and teddy bears) not covered by insurance for UCSF's pediatric patients and their families.

The bottom line was assisted by a luxurious lineup of silent-auction goodies including VIP tickets to the Madonna concert, an S.F. Giants-Dodgers baseball package, and a high-tech, grilled cheese lunch for 10 with MC Hammer at Jonathan Kaplan's Melt restaurant.

And it turns out that Hammer, who recently celebrated his 50th birthday at a party hosted by Conway at the Tonga Room. not only knows how to dance - he knows from kids. too.

"I have six kids, so I understand the needs of families." said the rapper. "I had a premature baby 61/2 years ago and met a lot of families during that extended time at the hospital. So it's great to see events like this one focused on helping families and kids."
